chosen by the school!










Future ready means now.: When students at the elementary level visit colleges, they begin to see themselves in those spaces and begin thinking about their future.






We want to thank our Seniors for their support and informational presentations. Because of you our Middle Schoolers took with them valuable information that will help them when making decisions about their college choices.
